## Successful Students

Success defined as earning grades of B or better in all college coursework attempted.

Students who have been successful over the years in the post-secondary enrollments program have possessed most or all of the following characteristics:

- 1. Have sought challenges in previous experiences.
- Have been willing and able to engage in activities without parents or other family members present. (camps for example)
- 3. Are self-directed when it comes to completing assignments and studying.
- 4. Not necessarily content with A's. Seek to do their best work.
- 5. Excellent attendance
- 6. Willing to make sacrifices to achieve goals.
- 7. Adapt easily to unfamiliar environments.
- 8. Comfortable when the only young person in a group.
- 9. Adapts amount of time and effort to the difficulty of the task.
- 10. A grade point average of 3.5 or higher in college prep coursework.
- 11. Scored comfortably above the needed minimum standard on the college placement tests.
- 12. If enrolling in math, has passed Algebra II with a grade of 90% or higher and has scored comfortably above the needed minimum on the college placement test.

## **Unsuccessful Students**

Students who have been unsuccessful in the post-secondary program have possessed one or more of the following characteristics:

- 1. A tendency to avoid difficult or challenging work
- 2. A need to have acquaintances involved in an activity before attempting it.
- 3. Must be reminded to do homework, take notes or study.
- 4. Regularly settle for less than their best work.
- 5. Miss, on average, more than 2 days per 9 week grading period.
- 6. See school as a necessary evil; that is, schoolwork tends to be low on the priority list.
- 7. Finds it difficult to adapt to new situations or people.
- 8. "Is bored" in high school and expects college courses to be more interesting.
- 9. Just barely meets the college's minimum standards.
- 10. Enamored of the idea of the "greater freedom" allowed by a college schedule.
